Goat Riding Anomaly

The *Scottish Rite Journal*, Sept 91/Southern jurisdiction, has an elegantly written article entitled, "Freemasonry Is A Secret Society To Many Of Its Members" by Ronald C. Radatz 32. In short, the gist of the article is a reference to some of the misconceptions harbored by todays brethren; one in particular referenced the age old cliché Riding The Goat and elaborated how an uninformed brother may lend an unknowing hand in perpetuating an anti-Masonic stereotype.

For those without access to the Journal, according to Brother Radatz:

Originally goats were used in the wildly misplaced belief that some sort of satanism existed in the Craft. In the Burlesque parades someone parodying as a Brother would attempt to ride a goat which represented the devil. Bro. Radatz further stated: Using this phrase to describe our Ritual is more than unfortunate and derogatory. It trivializes our impressive Initiation ceremony and mocks the very institution we love.

After reflecting, there are numerous instances in which I can recall the use of this cant, most were from aged and well respected brethren, whom I feel after reading the article would cease this perpetuation.

Being thankful for the knowledge gained from this reading, I erased this phrase from my mind and vowed to do my best to enlighten the uninformed. That was until I happened across a copy of the August 1991 Knight Templar magazine page-18 and, to my surprise, discovered an ad offering Riding The Goat prints for sale. What a minds dilemma this posed, I suppose I could take the serious path as Bro. Radatz did and follow my vow of erasure and enlightenment, or I could order one of the prints and hang it as a reminder of that human quest for levity with little regard to its true origin or moral meaning.

Constitution and Laws

TITLE SEVEN: APPENDIX ARTICLE IV. TRUSTEES

Section 1. The Board of Trustees shall consist of three members, one of whom shall be elected at the first annual communication for one year, one for two years and one for three years, and thereafter, at each annual election, one Trustee shall be elected for a term of three years.

Section 2. A Trustee may also hold an appointive office in the lodge.

Section 3. The duties of the Trustees shall be to receive, hold, care for, and invest, under the direction of the lodge, all funds and property committed to their care. They shall promptly report to the lodge in writing each investment made by them. They shall keep themselves informed as to the conditions relating to any security or investment of the lodge funds and shall promptly report to the lodge in writing any matter affecting such investment or security. They shall keep all securities of the lodge in a safe deposit box in the name of the lodge. They shall have general charge and supervision of the lodge room, furniture and property of the lodge and shall see that the same is kept properly insured at all times. They shall render an annual report at the first regular communication in January, giving a full account of all receipts and disbursements and an itemized statement of all investments and property held by them.

Section 4. Lodge funds shall be invested only as directed by the lodge and in such investments as may be lawful for funds of savings and fiduciary institutions of the State of New Jersey

A Review From The South

Board article for Mt. Moriah and endeavored to inspire and instill light from the South as is expected of the Junior Warden. FROM ENGLAND: BROTHER RIC BERMAN Foundations, The Prestonian Lecture

R.W. Vaughan is a Mason of 40 years' standing and has served in various leadership positions in the Fraternity. A few years ago he decided to use the skills acquired lecturing around the United States and across the world and began a new career in his retirement as an author. His next endeavor was Renaissance Man & Mason, a collection of talks given over the past 20 years.
